PREFACE

This edition of the *Journal for Contemporary History (JCH)* starts with reflections on the theme of contemporary history. In this section André Wessels, my predecessor as editor, provides a very good critical interpretation of the history of the *JCH* – which have been with us the past 40 years. His contribution is succeeded by an interpretation of the concept of contemporary history by the well-known journalist and historian Leopold Scholtz. This contribution by Scholtz will be the first in a series of forthcoming articles by contributors positioning themselves from different theoretical perspectives. This first section is succeeded by a section on themes in 20th century South African history (with contributions by Tabata, Verhoef, Labuschagne and Van der Westhuizen) and a section on post-1994 South African history (with contributions by Van Eeden and Khaba, Joshua and Greffrath). This edition ends with a section on themes in contemporary African history (with contributions by Shilaho, Simelane, Niyitunga, and Olivier).

Finally, it is with great sadness that we are saying farewell to one of our contributing editors, Pieter Kapp. Professor Kapp (born 1939), a well-respected South African and Afrikaans historian, died on 13 December 2015.
